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Course Description

Study and performance of varied choral repertoire. The mixed voice, traveling group represents LeTourneau University at various off-campus venues and also serves on campus. Membership is by audition only. Membership is typically for one complete academic year. May be repeated for credit.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

Participation in the LeTourneau Singers will be, for the music-loving student, a rich experience of growing in the technical skills necessary for quality vocal and choral performance and of encountering the rich aesthetic and emotional content that the arts can convey. These skills include healthy vocal technique in the areas of posture, breathing, tone placement, diction, and expression; the reading of music notation and its aspects of pitch, rhythm, symbols, and vocabulary; the ability to sing independently and cooperatively within a group; and an understanding of historic musical styles and their proper interpretation.

Members of the LeTourneau Singers will develop their God-given musical gifts while ministering as representatives of LETU, both in recruiting and in making the world a more beautiful and God-redolent place. Singers will perform a wide variety of styles of choral music and experience the excitement of being part of a team striving for excellence in rehearsal and performance. Furthermore, they will develop competency in being constructively critical and self-evaluative about personal and group performances.

In a performance choir, the repertoire sung is the curriculum, and performances are the "exams," as it were. As each student masters the challenges in each piece, new skills and perceptions are acquired, which translate to future performance. Through this process singers enjoy greater mastery, which is the process in which musicians are born and developed.

The university's mission statement reads, "LeTourneau University is a comprehensive institution of Christian higher education where educators engage learners to nurture Christian virtue, to develop competency and ingenuity in their professional fields, to integrate faith and work, and to serve the local and global community." This course shares in that mission in the following ways:

- By being steeped in a humanities course such as this one, students broaden their perspective of what it means to be human. To grow in one's appreciation for aesthetics is to grow in the perception of an important aspect of God's nature, and to glorify him for the beauty he has put in the world. LeTourneau students who are gifted in technical areas will richly benefit from exposure to this other more subjective and non-measurable side of creation. Research shows that engaging in artistic activities enhances one's abilities to perform technical tasks. Aristotle felt that a full-orbed education involves Academics, Arts, and Athletics, a viewpoint that set the course of liberal arts education in Western Civilization.
- Participation in a performing choral group in a Christian university affords the opportunity to verbalize and share in
 the messages of many Christian poets and composers. Not every choral piece performed will be of a religious
 nature, but many will be, and these texts, after being rehearsed many times, will have a tendency to stay in the
 heart and mind for years. Like the memorization of Scripture, these words can have a profound effect on the life
 of the singer, especially when wedded to moving and memorable melodies.
- Unlike most classes at LeTourneau University, the LeTourneau Singers produces a product that is observable and able to be experienced (the performance). Rehearsal is working together, coordinating disparate voice parts to achieve a beautiful goal, growing in competency together in an effort to serve the listening audience by presenting an item of loveliness that is a blessing to all who hear. The fact that choir members are singing in real harmony is, as composer John Rutter says, "an emblem for what we need in this world, when so much of the world is at odds with itself...Just to express in symbolic terms what it's like when human beings are in harmony that's a lesson for our time, for all times." Grading Scale

Students with four (4) unexcused absences at the end of the semester will receive a B, five (5) absences a C, six (6) a D, and more than 6 an F. Classroom Policies

Engagement and quality of participation

Being a member of a choral ensemble is the equivalent of being a member of a sports team. Each member of the ensemble is critical to the success of the entire team. A positive attitude, teach-ability, punctuality, dependability, and a strong work ethic are essential as we work together in our weekly rehearsals, culminating in successful public performances. This is accomplished by being focused, singing with heart, having good posture, always noting breath marks and other markings given by the director, and being a force for harmony within the ensemble. As campus and public representatives of LeTourneau University, members of the LETU Singers must maintain the highest standards of musicianship, scholarship, and personal excellence.

Excused absences, sickness, other attendance issues

Always try to notify the Director before an absence, whether excused or unexcused. Excused absences include: 1) activities in which you represent the institution or must attend a mandatory meeting or field trip for another class; 2) illness (describing the specific description of your condition); 3) funerals, and 4) two Supplemental Instructor sessions (SIs) per semester.

Electronic devices

Cell phones are to be put away during rehearsal, and unavailable for texting or vibrating. Students who violate this policy will be counted absent for that day. In the rare situation that you are expecting an emergency phone call, let the Director know before class. Have your phone on vibrate and when the call comes, go out in the hall to receive it.

Promptness, leaving early

Rehearsals start on time. Three tardies equal an absence. Leaving a rehearsal early will result in a tardy for that rehearsal. Please take care of rest room needs before rehearsal. If you absolutely must go to the rest room during

rehearsal, catch the eye of the director first. If there is a chronic medical condition that necessitates leaving class, let the conductor know at the beginning of the semester.

Inability to sing on a particular day

If a singer has laryngitis or for some other reason other than a communicable disease cannot sing on a particular day, he/she is to attend rehearsal and sit on the side and listen, following along in the score (no phone or other homework).

Attendance at final rehearsals and concerts

All final rehearsals, concerts, performance events, and choir activities are mandatory. Any student who misses these without prior notification or the occasion of a serious emergency will have his/her final grade reduced by one letter. Employers must be notified well ahead of time so that attendance at these rehearsals and performances will not be a problem.

Academic Honesty

A foundation of mutual trust is essential to the learning community. That trust is broken when the standards of right and wrong that all students and faculty are expected to uphold are violated. Academic dishonesty is a serious breach of trust within the LeTourneau University community because it violates the regard for truth essential to genuine learning and Christian consistency. From a broader perspective, it hurts all students and their peers who try to do their work with integrity and therefore should not be tolerated among peers. Given the serious nature of academic dishonesty, a student experiencing particular difficulties in a course is encouraged to discuss the problem with the instructor rather than succumb to the pressure to commit academic dishonesty.

Academic dishonesty is not qualitatively different from other types of dishonesty. It consists of misrepresentation in an attempt to deceive. In an academic setting, this may take any number of forms such as: Copying or using unauthorized aids in tests, examinations or laboratory reports. Plagiarism, the submission of work created by someone else as if it were one's own. Use of files, tests, problems, or lab reports from previous classes other than allowed by the faculty member. Looking at an examination paper or answer sheet of another student. Obtaining, before or during the administration of a test, unauthorized information regarding the test. Possessing or distributing a test or other assignment material before or during its administration. Cooperating or aiding in any of the above.

Plagiarizing or cheating on an assignment or test will result in a 0 for that assignment. Additional cheating could result in a failure of the course. In the event of plagiarism or cheating your advisor and the VP of Student Affairs will be notified in writing. Textbooks and Other Resources

Choral folders, music, and pencils are provided by the university, and remain the property of LETU. Students must return the folders and music in good condition at the end of the semester or will incur the charge of \$5 per piece of music and \$10 for each folder.

Performance Schedule

The LeTourneau Singers usually sing twice in chapels each semester and perform in a significant concert at the end of the semester. There may be ambassadorial concerts during the year as well. Performance dates are given verbally and in writing as far ahead of time as possible. Singers are to clear all obstacles to their participation ahead of time so that all singers are able to participate. Changes to the schedule of events are given both verbally and in writing, at which time all students will be required to participate in newly-scheduled activities. There is no final exam, *per se.*

Performance Attire

Each student is responsible for obtaining:

Formal concert wear

- Men: White Oxford shirt, black bow tie, black socks, dress shoes
- Ladies: Solid black long dress (below the knee, shoulders covered, may be above or below elbow) or black pants suit; black, closed-toe or open-toe shoes

Casual concert wear

 Royal blue LeTourneau polo shirt (available in the bookstore), blue jeans in good condition and casual shoes (sandals for women are acceptable)
